

ST. JOSEPH CATHOLIC CHURCH EASTER TRIDUUM 2022

The Easter Triduum begins on Holy Thursday with the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper and continues through Good Friday and Holy Saturday, reaching its high point at the Easter Vigil.



HOLY THURSDAY - APRIL 14

Mass of the Lord's Supper begins at 7:30 p.m.

You are invited to bring an offering of personal supplies for those in need such as socks, toothpaste, toothbrush, soap, shampoo, razor, deodorant, women's underwear or towel. During Mass you will be asked to bring them to the altar. These will be delivered to St. Lawrence Centre/Wapiti House.

Incense will be used at this Mass.

Please bring bells (hand bells, dinner bells, or any other delicate bells) to ring during the Gloria, which we have not heard since the beginning of Lent.

It is proper to kneel when the Blessed Sacrament is carried through the church at the end of Mass. Once Mass is over, we ask that you depart in silence.

Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament will be in the chapel following Mass until 12:00 Midnight.

GOOD FRIDAY - APRIL 15

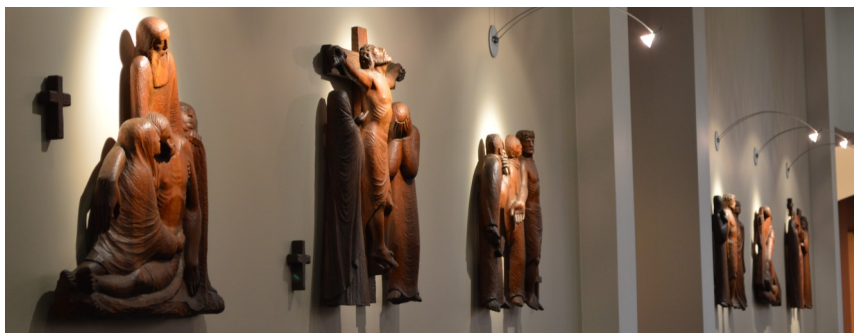
Celebration of the Lord's Passion begins at 3:00 p.m. *(This will be live-streamed)*

Mass is not celebrated on this day or before the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday. On Good Friday we remember the death of Jesus; the service is stark in its simplicity. There is no water in the baptism font, the ministers do not process in or out. There are three parts to the liturgy of the day: the Liturgy of the Word, the Adoration of the Holy Cross and Holy Communion with what was consecrated on Holy Thursday.

A special collection will be made on this day for the Holy Land. This collection helps maintain Christian sites in the Holy Land and supports projects that help Christians remain and thrive in the region.

Good Friday is a universal day of fasting and abstinence from meat. Fasting means we have one regular meal and less at other meals, and no snacking. Fasting is not intended to cause harm to your health. If you have a medical condition in which fasting is harmful you should not fast. When possible, we try to extend the discipline of fasting and abstaining from meat until after the Vigil on Holy Saturday.

Christian fasting obtains its full meaning when we deprive ourselves of food, or unnecessary beverages, in order to be more open for prayer, to share more in the suffering of those who are starving and to save money to give to the poor.



For an otherwise healthy individual the law of abstinence from meat binds those who are 14 and older; the law of fasting binds those from 18 to 59 years of age.

HOLY SATURDAY - APRIL 16 (There is no 7:00 p.m. Mass on this night.)

Easter Vigil begins at 9:00 p.m. and will conclude at approximately 11:30 p.m.

We invite you to gather around the Easter fire as early as 8:30 p.m. (at the entrance to the church)

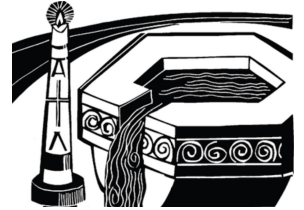
The Easter Vigil has four parts: the Service of Light, the Liturgy of the Word, the Liturgy of Baptism and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. By most ancient tradition this is the night of keeping vigil for the Lord. As we begin the vigil the people of God, carrying lighted lamps, should be like those looking for the Lord when He returns, so that at His coming He may find us awake and have us sit at His table.

The Easter Vigil satisfies your Sunday Mass obligation for Easter Sunday.

St. Augustine said that the Easter Vigil is to be considered the most important of all vigils.

On this night we celebrate the sacraments of initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist).

Following the Easter Vigil join us in Tranquille Hall for a celebration of our newly baptized. Please bring a sweet (squares, cookies, etc.), fruit, or savory (cheese, crackers...) to share. Drop them off in the hall between 8:00 and 9:00 p.m.

Holy Water: At the Easter Vigil we bless the Easter water, the water that will be used for baptisms. You are welcome to bring appropriate empty containers to the Easter Vigil or to Mass on Easter Sunday and bring home some of the Easter water. This water will be available until after Mass on Easter Sunday.

Please Note:

- **Confession** is not available on Holy Saturday.
 - **Easter Sunday Masses:** 9:00 & 11:00 a.m. (this Mass will be live-streamed), and 1:00 p.m.
 - **Incense is not used on Easter Sunday.**
 - **Easter Monday Mass** will be celebrated at 12:15 p.m., in the Church.
- Parish Office Closed on Good Friday & Easter Monday.*

HOLY WEEK EXTRAS:

Chrism Mass Tuesday, April 12, 7:30 pm at St. John the Baptist Cathedral, McLennan. The three oils used in the celebration of sacraments - Oil of Catechumens, Oil of the Infirm, and Chrism - are blessed at this Mass and the clergy of the diocese, along with the bishop, recommit themselves to their priestly ministry. Everyone is encouraged to attend this special Mass.

Good Friday Liturgy of the Word with Children - April 15 at 11:00 a.m. (*A pre-recorded Liturgy of the Word With Children will be available on-line*) Please keep in mind that this is intended for young children. We include this liturgy as a means of trying to help children understand why we celebrate on Good Friday - Jesus' passion for us, through his death on the cross. ✞ *The Eucharist is not distributed at this liturgy.*

Blessing of Festive Food: It is the tradition of people from many cultures to ask for God's blessing on the festive foods to be used at Easter. This blessing is usually celebrated on Holy Saturday. We will be celebrating the Blessing of Food at 3:00 p.m. in the church, on Saturday, April 16.

Please ensure that candles do not drip onto the carpet.
